






POETRY

Gerald Stern is one of America's most distinguished poets. He is the author of more than 10 collections of poetry, including Odd Mercy, Lucky Life, The Red Coal, and Paradise Poems. He has taught and lectured at many universities, and is a past faculty member of the Aspen Writers' Conference. His awards and prizes include the Lamont Poetry Prize, The Guggenheim Fellowship, and several National Endowment for the Arts grants.



#### Marcia Southwick

Marcia Southwick is the author of Why The River Disappears, The Night Won't Save Anyone, Connecticut: Eight Poems, and Her Six Difficulties And His Small Mistakes. Her work has appeared in several anthologies and magazines. She is the recipient of a National Endowment for the Arts Fellowship, and is a past faculty member of the Aspen Writers' Conference. She currently teaches creative writing at the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque.



# FICTION

Ron Carlson Ron Carlson is the author of five books of fiction: the story collections The Hotel Eden, Plan B for the Middle Class. The News of the World; and two novels, Truants and Betrayed by F. Scott Fitzgerald. His fiction has appeared in Harper's, Gentleman's Quarterly, Esquire, Story and dozens of other journals and anthologies. Carlson has been awarded an NEA Fellowship in Fiction as well as the 1993 Ploughshares Cohen Prize. He is currently a Professor of English at Arizona State University.



#### Valerie Miner

Valerie Miner is an award-winning writer whose seven novels include A Walking Fire, Blood Sisters, All Good Women, Winter's Edge, Movement, and Murder in the English Department. Her work has appeared in Ploughshares, the Michigan Quarterly, The Village Voice and many other journals. Miner has received awards and fellowships from the Rockefeller Foundation, the NEA and the Heinz Foundation, among other sources. She is currently a Professor of English and Creative Writing at the University of Minnesota.

David Rieff is a widely published writer and journalist. His work covers a variety of subjects including international conflict, disaster, immigration and American politics. ### Tuition & Audit Fees:

Tuition for the Aspen Writers' Conference is \$495. For those who cannot attend daily workshops, audit passes are available for \$125/week and include admission to afternoon lectures, evening readings, and selected special events only.

#### Lodging:


Convenient on-campus accommodations are available for Conference participants at The Aspen Institute, Aspen Meadows. Jan Greenberg is the award-winning author of 10 books for young readers. Her novel No Dragons To Slay was an ALA Best Book, and her American Eye series on twentieth century art received the IRA Teachers' Choice Award and an ALA Notable Books Award. She teaches creative writing at Webster University in St. Louis, Missouri and conducts workshops at writers' conferences throughout the country.



has received a fellowship from the NEA and currently teaches in the MFA Program for Writers at Warren Wilson College.

Tom Auer is the publisher and editor in chief of The Bloomsbury Review, a Book Magazine published in Denver and distributed nationally and internationally. He has worked as a freelance writer and editor and has edited a variety of trade and consumer publications over the past 20 years. He is currently writing a biography of the late poet and publisher, Alan Swallow, founder of Swallow Press and other imprints. In 1996 he received the Jack D. Rittenhouse Award from the Rocky Mountain Book Publishers Association for "outstanding contributions to publishing in the West."

George Nicholson is a senior agent with Sterling Lord Literistic, Inc., which represents some 500 writers. During his exceptional career, he has worked as an editor and publisher for companies such as Dell/Delacorte/Doubleday Books, Holt, Rinehart and Winston, and Viking Press. He is known as a leader in children's book publishing and is widely credited with generating the explosion in children's paperback publishing.

Carol Houck Smith is an editor at large at W. W. Norton, where she specializes in literary and general non-fiction. Authors with whom she has worked include Pam Houston, Rick Bass, Charles Baxter, Ron Carlson, Haynes Johnson, and Andrea Barrett. Among poets, she has been editor for Gerald Stern, Rita Dove, Maxine Kumin, Ellen Bryant Voigt, and Stanley Kunitz. She is a trustee of Ploughshares, a former board member of the Associated Writing Programs, and a member of the advisory board of Writers at Work, the Park City, Utah, writers' conference. Prior to becoming editor at large, she was an editor and vice president in the trade department at W.W. Norton.
