Racine County, here's your reading assignment

Residents invited to read 'Bless Me, Ultima' by book lovers

RACINE COUNTY — The 188,831 people of Racine County are cordially invited to do the exact same thing at the exact same time. We're all invited to read the same book.

Racine Reads, a coalition of local book lovers, is hoping to get absolutely everybody to read "Bless Me, Ultima." The novel, laced with Catholic and traditional Latino overtones, is by Rudolfo Anaya.

The Racine Public Library, the University of Wisconsin-Parkside and local bookstores will sponsor discussion groups and other events focusing on "Bless Me, Ultima." The events are being scheduled during Hispanic Heritage Month, which runs Sept. 15 to Oct. 15.

"Bless Me, Ultima" is a coming-of-age story, intertwined with mystery, religious mysticism, and Hispanic culture.

Racine's Hispanic population has grown 54 percent in just 10 years, according to the 2000 Census. But the Racine Reads coalition isn't only targeting Hispanics; they're asking that everyone in the county read the book.

"It's a way to pull the city together," says Jessica MacPhail, director of the Racine Public Library and a member of the Racine Reads coalition. "Even though we'll all have different experiences reading the book, hopefully when we start talking to each other about it we'll find some commonalties."

Other parts of the country

have sponsored area-wide book reads. Chicago is reading one of Mayor Richard M. Daley's favorite books, "To Kill a Mockingbird."

"To Kill a Mockingbird" won a Pulitzer Prize, which can't be said for "Bless Me, Ultima." But "Bless Me, Ultima" is generally regarded as a major work of Latino-American fiction.

"It was my first novel, published in 1972. It was at the beginning of what we call the Chicano literature renaissance," Anaya said in a brief telephone interview. "The book represents my hometown, my environment in the 1940s when I was growing up.

"The important thing is that a book lead to discussion. Not everybody will like it. That's OK."

As for Racine County's planned focus on his book, Anaya said: "I didn't know this was happening. This is a great idea."

"Bless Me, Ultima" tells the story of a boy and the curandera who moves into his home. A curandera is a woman who heals with herbs and religious mysticism. For some Catholics of Latino heritage, the magic of a


